Good afternoon, I am Siobhán Christou. I am a Registered Nurse and one of two Communicable Disease nurses who work in the Bureau of Disease Control for the Onondaga County Health Department.

I want to start out with some numbers:

20 is the number of nurse's employed by the county currently. This is down since the start of the pandemic.

\$0.00 is the amount of shift differential we received for working countless evening and weekend hours during the pandemic.

Each nurse working for the county has sacrificed to keep our community safe. We were physically here in the office day in and day out, weekends, holidays, whatever was needed. We are the ones who were reassuring newly diagnosed COVID patients who had no idea whether they were going to live or die, while contact tracing to ensure there was no further spread. We are the ones who adapted to the ever changing guidance and continued to work tirelessly to put the health of others ahead of our own. Once the vaccine came out, we again, stepped up and vaccinated our community members, some of us, before we were fully vaccinated ourselves. We have continuously acclimated to different roles for the health of the public and are asking for such a small amount in return.

We are NOT just COVID nurses. We also investigate and mitigate food-borne illnesses, assess animal encounters with the public to prevent the fatal rabies virus, screen and treat Tuberculosis, STDs, the list goes on and on.

The County's current proposal of a 2% wage increase feels like a slap in the face. My colleagues are throwing up their hands in exasperation and taking positions where they feel valued and respected. The County must take action to retain and recruit high quality professionals to provide the critical public health services that Onondaga County residents rely on.

I would like to close with a few more numbers for thought:

An RN at Cortland County now makes 17% more than an RN at the comparable step at Onondaga County.

NYSNA members at Madison County were given an across the board increase of 15.89% this past year.

5.9% is the projected COLA (cost of living adjustment)-the highest increase in almost 40 years.

We are currently in negotiations for our new contract and we are asking you to honor the heroes of the pandemic... the nurses. We are a small group of hard working people that are asking for the recognition that we so justly deserve. We are hoping that the County Legislature shows us the same support and appreciation the public has shown us throughout this pandemic. We want to retain the nurses that we have left who have proven time and time again, that we are valuable, knowledgeable, reliable, and most importantly, care about the people and community that we live in.

Good afternoon Chairman Knapp and members of the County Legislature.

I am Linda Geariety. I am the NYSNA union local president and later this month, I will be starting my 17th year here as a county nurse.

I come before you today, encouraging you to show your support for your County nurses. I recognize that no one really wants to talk or think about COVID. Trust me, neither do the nurses! So today, I would like to talk to you about the part of the COVID pandemic that most people don't know about.

While life was put on pause, the activities in the Health dept continued. Since the start of this pandemic, there have been 19 either active/or suspect cases of Tuberculosis. Each one had to have their own contact investigation, medical workup, and any contacts had to be tested and if needed, begin treatment. But the primary work for the nurses was COVID investigations.

High risk and teenage pregnancies happened. The nurses were instructed that they should check on their moms when there is time. This could be accomplished by either phone or video calls. Now considering that each nurse was putting in solid 8-10 hour days, many times stretching to 12 hour days doing COVID investigations, it didn't really leave time for calling these pregnant moms.

Yet, COVID investigations marched

As you may have heard on the news, STD's remained prevalent in our community, especially syphilis. Since the start of the pandemic, it has been reported twice to the public about a syphilis outbreak. Dedicated STD clinics were arranged to test and treat any cases. And COVID work for the nurses continued.

The nurses for the Long Term program – our elderly in need of services, had 2 nurses trying to juggle

arranging for their needs as the calls came in all the while getting pulled to do COVID investigations.

Let's not forget about rabies, dog bites, ticks, Lyme disease and enterics (GI stuff). These all require their own Investigations and treatment arranged if necessary. But these nurses were doing COVID investigations too.

Time moves on, the numbers remain high. While the time devoted strictly to COVID has lessened, the nurses are still required to divide their time between the two. Healthy Families has suffered the loss of 6 staff members leaving. Recruitment to fill these positions is happening, but salary is reported to being a primary deterrent to accepting a position.

And then the Vaccines got approved. The work shifted from investigations to administering the vaccine. Again long clinics where nurses were pulled from all departments – long term, BDC and Healthy

Families to staff and manage these clinics. Today, the nurses wanted to be present while we spoke before you to show unity. A STD clinic and a vaccine clinic made that impossible to do. And now the 5-11 year olds have been approved and more clinics to be scheduled. This again, will pull us away from our "regular" duties. This has an impact on our clients, your constituents.

We currently are a group of 20 nurses. We have brought proposals to the table in an effort to make our wages competitive with other counties or agencies around us. A nurse came up to me the other day stating that the starting wage for a neighboring county health dept is higher than what she is currently making with Onondaga County. And she has been here for a couple of years.

People have often said to me, well look at what a nurse makes at Upstate. And my response has always been that you can't compare the county to the hospital. But Upstate also has outpatient clinics that operate Monday through Friday just like the County. So I investigated this and found that the

base pay for an RN is the same for the hospital and the outpatient clinic. So that argument no longer stands to me. And we have lost 2 of the abovementioned nurses to Upstate.

Please support us in achieving a fair and equitable wage. Our proposals on the table aren't to be greedy or outlandish. But rather to make us more competitive in securing well trained professionals. We have been stretched and pulled to the max trying to maintain the quality standards that we each expect of ourselves as well as the County. The comments that nurses have received from the public during vaccine clinics has been nothing but praise and gratitude. But being short staffed and doing "double duty" so to speak has taken its toll.

APPROVING THE INCLUSION OF VIABLE AGRICULTURAL LAND WITHIN CERTIFIED AGRICULTURAL DISTRICTS PURSUANT TO SECTION 303-B OF THE NEW YORK STATE AGRICULTURE AND MARKETS LAW

WHEREAS, Section 303-b of Agriculture and Markets Law provides land owners with an annual thirty day period to submit requests for the inclusion of predominantly viable agricultural lands within certified agricultural districts; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 71-2004, that thirty-day period began January 1, 2021, and ended January 30, 2021; and

WHEREAS, land owners have filed requests for inclusion of predominantly viable agricultural land within certified agricultural districts; and

WHEREAS, the County referred the requests to the Onondaga County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board, and that Board has reviewed such requests and determined that such property, other than Town of Elbridge parcels 029.-03-14.2 and 029.-03-35.0, consists predominantly of viable agricultural land and that the inclusion of such land, other than Town of Elbridge parcels 029.-03-14.2 and 029.-03-35.0, would serve the public interest by assisting in maintaining a viable agricultural industry within the districts, and recommends such property for inclusion within the certified agricultural districts, excepting the parcels within the Town of Elbridge; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on Thursday, November 4, 2021 at 12:55 p.m. relating to such requested inclusions; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the proposed action is an Unlisted action and this Legislature shall act as the Lead Agency for the purposes of the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA); and, be it further

RESOLVED, that the Short Environmental Assessment Form for this project has been completed and reviewed and is on file with the Clerk of the Legislature; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that this Legislature hereby finds and declares a negative declaration under SEQRA in that there is no anticipated construction and no anticipated change in use, that the identified possible impacts, if any, on air quality and surface water quality will not be significant and there is little likelihood of significant adverse environmental impacts; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that based on the recommendation of the Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board and information provided through the public hearing, this Onondaga County Legislature hereby adopts and approves the inclusion of the requested viable agricultural land within certified Agricultural District No. 3, with the exception of Town of Elbridge parcels 029.-03-14.2 and 029.-03-35.0; and, be it further
